Many Jews<br>refrain from work and<br>school activities.<br>•<br>Observance begins at<br>sunset every Friday and<br>extends to sunset<br>Saturday. | Begins 10 days of<br>repentance.<br>•<br>IMPORTANT NOTE:<br>ANTICIPATE<br>WIDESPREAD<br>ABSENCE | Most solemn holy<br>day, devoted to<br>praying and fasting.<br>•<br>IMPORTANT NOTE:<br>ANTICIPATE<br>WIDESPREAD<br>ABSENCE | Celebrates the har-<br>vest, SheminiAtzeret<br>and Simchat Torah.<br>•<br>Sukkot is followed by<br>Shemini Atzeret and<br>Simchat Torah<br>celebrating the<br>conclusion of the<br>reading<br>of the Torah and<br>renewing<br>the cycle. | Festive holiday<br>rededication of the<br>Holy Temple in<br>Jerusalem after a<br>successful revolt<br>against Syrian-Greek<br>conquerors.<br>•<br>Chanukah, celebrated<br>each night for eight<br>nights, is a minor<br>holiday and REQUIRES<br>NO ABSENCES. | Commemorates the<br>ancient Israelites'<br>deliverance from<br>Egyptian bondage.
